# Kokushikan General Information 2013

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
After the Meiji Restoration, Japan began to actively absorb western civilization and to promote rapid modernization of its society. As a result Japan was able to achieve breathtaking social and economic advances during this period. However, this brought the destruction of traditional culture and the disregard of traditional values. Following the Russo-Japanese War (1904-05), the domestic situation worsened, and people's thinking changed. Consequently, various social problems emerged, which gave rise to serious social instability.

It was during this period that Tokujiro Shibata and a group of likeminded people concerned with the future of Japanese society came together to form "Seinen Dai-Mindan"(Greater Association of Youth). The purpose of the Association was to "reform Japan" by means of social improvement and educating young people. The growing activities of the Association culminated in the birth of "Kokushikan," a private academy established in 1917 based on the principle of "Katsugaku"(practical education).

As mentioned in the statement of the purport for establishing Kokushikan, the founders aimed to educate young people with wisdom and confidence to contribute towards the development of the nation and society. Guided by the spirit and philosophy of Yoshida Shoin, the founders sought to achieve this goal through the training of spirit and body and the development of character founded on daily "practice."

Since then, Kokushikan has remained committed to the philosophy of educating people who can help build the nation. Our goal has been the cultivation of the Four Precepts: Sincerity, Industriousness, Insight and Spiritual Strength, which students are encouraged to aspire to through constant "reading, experience, and reflection." Based on this approach, Kokushikan has sent out a large number of graduates who have contributed and continue to contribute to progress in various fields.

Today, Educational Foundation of Kokushikan continues to cherish the philosophy of education carefully nurtured since its founding. At the same time, Kokushikan is earnestly committed to actively contributing to the needs of society by raising its levels of knowledge and practice in newly developed areas of research and learning, and by striving to realize a peaceful and sustainable society.



## Origins and Philosophy of Education

#### Biography

Hideo Osawa was born in Hokkaido in 1936, and graduated from the Faculty of Physical Education at Kokushikan University in 1960.

He joined the staff of the university in 1960 and became a professor in the Faculty of Physical Education in 1981. He served as head of the faculty from 1992 to 2001 and as president of Kokushikan University from 2003 to 2006.

In 2006, he became an Emeritus Professor and a member of the Executive Board of the Educational Foundation of Kokushikan. He began to serve as the Vice Chairman of the Executive Board from June 2008, before becoming Chairman of the Executive Board in April 2009.

He was Chairman of the Executive Board of the Japan University Football Association (JUFA) in 1998, and a member of the Executive Board of the Japan Football Association (JFA) in 1992. He was Chairman of the Japan Association of Heads of Universities, Schools and Faculties related to Physical Education in 2004, and has been a consultant at JUFA from 2008.

He has served as Director of the Council of Physical Education Universities since 2009 and Director of the Association of Private Universities of Japan since 2012.

Since its founding as the Kokushikan private academy in 1917, Kokushikan has consistently conducted education emphasizing the cultivation of human beings who are outstanding in both academics and sports. When Kokushikan University was opened in 1958, the Faculty of Physical Education was established. Since then, thanks to generous support from people both inside and outside Kokushikan, we have grown into a comprehensive educational foundation comprising a university with 7 undergraduate faculties and 10 graduate schools, an affiliated junior and a senior high school.

Kokushikan was founded 96 years ago on the idea of fostering individuals to help build the nation. Although the way of expressing this philosophy has changed over time, the underlying concept has remained the same: “devotion to others.” This means wholeheartedly doing everything you can for people, something which I learned when I was a student of Kokushikan’s founder, Tokujiro Shibata, who taught with deep compassion. Our founder endeavored to cultivate human resources by practicing the virtues of sincerity, industriousness, insight, and spiritual strength, which are the educational precepts of our foundation today. As his successors, I believe it is our mission to pass on his ideas in accordance with the needs of the times.

I hear that since the Great East Japan Earthquake in 2011, there has been an increase in the number of young people with a strong desire to do something for others. This means that the philosophy of our founder, nearly a century ago, lives on to this very day. It is just this kind of person that is needed in Japan right now. In these times, when we are facing so many challenges both domestically and internationally, we are determined to carry on Kokushikan’s founding spirit and continue our earnest efforts to make a positive social contribution.

In 2017 we will celebrate the centennial of our founding. In preparation for that milestone, in 2008 we completed the Omegaoka Complex on our Setagaya Campus as a hub of education and research which we expect to support the progress of the age. As a result, we started integrated education with all major courses available on each campus, thus enabling students to have a more forward-looking four years by taking advantage of the special characteristics of each department and faculty. Furthermore, in April 2013 we opened the Maple Century Hall, a complex with five floors above ground and three basement floors featuring sports facilities, a student lounge, and other amenities that can be used by university and high school students at anytime. With the aim of further enhancing the study environment, we intend to continue our efforts to improve our campuses. Our hope is to continue serving as an affectionate and compassionate school so that students can feel truly glad they chose to study at Kokushikan.

### Academic exchange agreement concluded with Dalian Neusoft University of Information



In May 2013 Kokushikan concluded an academic exchange agreement with Dalian Neusoft University of Information in China. The university is the twelfth school in China with which Kokushikan has an international agreement, and altogether Kokushikan now has agreements with 40 universities and 1 institution in 19 countries and 1 region. Through exchange between faculty members and students, joint research, internships, sports, and various other exchange programs tailored to meet the objectives and levels of students, Kokushikan hopes to provide students with plenty of opportunities to further polish their international awareness and foreign language skills.

### Doctoral course established in Graduate School of Emergency Medical System

In April 2013 Kokushikan opened a doctoral course in the Graduate School of Emergency Medical System. The main aims of this doctoral course are to play a leading role in research on pre-hospital emergency treatment, to conduct research activities relating to pre-hospital emergency medicine, and to foster researchers who have a thorough knowledge of crisis management in times of disaster as well as emergency treatment at ordinary times and who can also promote the building of local emergency medical treatment systems.



### School of Science and Engineering celebrates 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary



In 2013 the School of Science and Engineering mark the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of its founding. Commemorative events have included practical workshops for elementary, junior high, and senior high school students, a special exhibition, and a lecture by Toshihide Masukawa, winner of the Nobel Prize in physics. The school was founded in 1963 as the Faculty of Engineering, since when it has endeavored to pursue advanced education and research in accordance with the progress of science and technology and changing needs of society and to foster talented engineers. The faculty was reorganized as the School of Science and Engineering in April 2007, introducing an educational system of “one department, six fields.” Through the organic linkage of the six fields, the school enables students to study a wide range of areas and aims to develop human resources capable of challenging the new era.

### Kokushikan again acquires AA – /stable rating on senior debts

On April 19, 2013, Kokushikan acquired an AA – ranking on senior debts with an outlook of “stable,” the same appraisal as last year, from Japan Credit Rating Agency, Ltd. AA – belongs to the AA range, which is the second highest of JCR’s 10 levels and it signifies a very high level of capacity to honor financial commitments on obligations. From now on also, Kokushikan will continue its earnest efforts to further improve the quality of its education and research and make a positive contribution to society.






#### Number of Students by Campus (Number of female students)









## Message from the President

### Biography

Born in Miyagi Prefecture in 1942, Nobuyuki Miura completed the doctoral course in political science in the Kokushikan University Graduate School of Political Science in 1971 and acquired his PhD in political science from this university in 1972.

He joined the faculty of Kokushikan University in 1971, becoming a professor of the Department of Political Science in the Faculty of Political Science and Economics in 1984 and serving as dean of that faculty from 1987 to 1992, vice-president of Kokushikan University and Kokushikan Junior College from 1992 to 1994, and president of Kokushikan University and Kokushikan Junior College from 1994 to 2003. He was also appointed director of the Kokushikan Educational Foundation and academic advisor in 2003.

He was appointed president of Kokushikan University in December 2012. He was also appointed director and councilor of the Kokushikan Educational Foundation in that year.

Besides these posts, he has served as chair of the Setagaya City Graded Post Reward Council since 2009, president of the Japanese Association of Law and Political Science since 2011, and Miyagi Kizuna Ambassador since 2013. His specialty is political science.

Kokushikan University traces its roots back to the Kokushikan private academy established by Tokujiro Shibata in Tokyo's Azabu district in 1917 to cultivate talented individuals. Viewing the distinguished intellectual Shoin Yoshida (1830-59) as a model, Shibata and his colleagues moved the academy in 1919 to its current location in Tokyo's Setagaya area, adjacent to Shoin Shrine, where the spirit of Yoshida is enshrined. In the 96 years since then, Kokushikan has developed into a full-blown university that has turned out over 120,000 graduates active in all walks of life.

The Japanese word *kokushi* in Kokushikan means "a person with a patriotic heart who serves society and the people." By basing its education on the four precepts of sincerity, industriousness, insight, and spiritual strength, Kokushikan University aims to develop *kokushis* capable of leading society.

Four years from now, Kokushikan University will be celebrating its centennial, and we are steadily moving forward with projects to mark this auspicious occasion. The Umegaoka Complex was opened on the Setagaya Campus in 2008. More recently, Maple Century Hall opened on the Setagaya Campus in April 2013. Created on the theme of developing a healthy mind and body, this new building brings together facilities for physical education and culture, and we look forward to students spending many fulfilling hours there challenging themselves mentally and physically.

In today's increasingly turbulent times, the decrease in the college-age population in Japan has led to a shakeout among universities, requiring them to carry out reforms in order to survive. Universities that accept a wide range of students are clearly required to put measures in place at both the entrance and the exit of their undergraduate programs. And at the exit, they are required to offer career guidance and other programs to foster individuals with the ability to engage in lifelong learning and to think independently.



#### Biography

Kazunari Kawano was born in Fukuoka Prefecture in 1944. He graduated in 1966 from the Faculty of Physical Education of Kokushikan University and joined the teaching staff of the Kokushikan Junior and Senior High Schools in the same year. In the Senior high school he instructed the Judo team.

In 1985, he founded the Junior High School Judo Team and served as its Manager for many years before being appointed General Manager for the Junior and Senior High School Judo Teams. Over the years, he has led many teams to first place in national championship tournaments. He has trained numerous first-class athletes who have won many medals in the Japan National Judo Championships, the World Judo Championships and in the Olympic Games.

In 1992, he was appointed Adviser to the All Japan High School Athletic Federation Judo Team.

In 2002, he assumed the post of Vice-Principal of Kokushikan Junior and Senior High Schools and has been serving as Principal since 2004. That same year, he was appointed to the Kokushikan Board of Council.

In 2007 he was appointed Chairman of the Kokushikan Sports Promotion Association.

The educational philosophy of Kokushikan is to cultivate the four virtues of sincerity, industriousness, insight, and spiritual strength by putting into practice the three principles of reading, experience, and reflection in thinking. These three principles correspond to what is now referred to as PDCA (that is, plan, do, check, action). Back in 1917, at the time of Kokushikan's establishment, our founder and predecessors had a vision way ahead of their time.

The six years spent in junior and senior high school are an important time in terms of developing a sound mind and body. Through the martial arts education that Kokushikan has consistently carried out, we aim to teach students the basics of behavior as human beings, in other words, how to interact with others and etiquette, and to foster a zest for living through training of the mind and body. However, this definitely should not be one-way. More than anything else, we believe it is important to teach students from their perspective in a warmhearted manner. If teachers themselves join their students and display an attitude of passionately tackling something, teachers and students can share the same feelings and time, and a sense of trust and strength to change the future will be created between them. The vitality of our students extends to various fields. As well as judo, synchronized swimming and soccer, sports in which we have produced Olympic athletes, we are proud of our sporting achievements in national tournaments. Moreover, our students have also excelled in cultural activities and received much praise. In addition to *shogi* (one of our students won the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Ricoh Cup Ladies Ouza Tournament) and essay writing (another of our students received the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science, and Technology's Encouragement Prize in the "My Opinion" essay contest), these cultural activities include the calligraphy club, brass band club, and art club.

Our junior high school implements small-group classes, and we also offer a variety of courses in such subjects as English conversation, environmental problems, and nursing care experience. In our senior high school full-time course, the first year is devoted to thorough development of the basic academic skills. From the second year onward, classes are offered with a view to increasing the ratio of students advancing to university. Students in the part-time and correspondence programs are able to attend lectures at Kokushikan University. By incorporating martial arts and art as a part of human education, we bring out the individual personalities of our students.

Junior and senior high school life is important as the first step in setting a direction for the future and approaching one's dreams. Through the knowledge acquired at Kokushikan and various experiences, we foster a sense of consideration toward others and a zest for life in students. Nothing is created without passion. With affection and passion, we make every effort and build an environment so that every student can fully display his or her abilities. That, I believe, is Kokushikan's role and mission.

The six years through junior and senior high school are an important time for growth of the mind and body as well as development of individuality and sensibility.

The Kokushikan junior and senior high schools focus not just on increasing academic ability, but "education of the heart" based on a unified junior-senior high school system.

The schools teach students etiquette, ethics, a moral outlook, and so forth and foster a "zest for living" which is needed in society.

### Junior High School

**Curriculum that improves basic academic abilities and incorporates moral education**

Junior high school is an important time for forming the foundation of one's character and abilities. Our school engages in education with a thorough structure in an effort to greatly expand the individuality and abilities of each student, based on the comfortable educational environment of the unified junior and senior school system. The curriculum has been formulated taking into consideration the improvement of basic academic abilities and moral education. In particular, martial arts, calligraphy, and morality are incorporated into classes, and thus students can learn things ranging from etiquette to ethics, self-control, and cooperation. In order to respond to internationalization, the school is placing a focus on the study of English. Students move forward with English studies with the objective of passing the Grade Pre-2 "Eiken" Test in Practical English Proficiency. They acquire conversational abilities that can be put to practical use by taking part in English conversation classes with native Englishspeaking instructors.

### Senior High School

**Aiming to foster human resources who are needed by society**

The three years through senior high school are an important time for development during which students find their intended path and acquire the abilities they need to achieve their goals. The school aims to boost the aptitude of each student and provide guidance on learning and living with the goal of nurturing education. Based on the fundamental abilities students have gained in junior high school, the senior high school develops a "zest for living" with physical strength, mental strength, and a sense of balance. A focus is placed on bringing out the characteristics and potential of each student. The school not only provides students with knowledge, but also creates an environment in which students think for themselves and grow, with the objective of fostering human resources who are needed by society.



### Afternoon Course

■ Comprehensive

**Flexible system in which students can also take correspondence program classes and university classes**

This course features a two-semester, credit-based, class-based system with three years of daytime classes beginning at 13:00, five days a week. The program is based on the improvement of basic scholastic ability with a focus on English. It features a flexible system with a link to the correspondence program, which students can take. It also offers high school-university collaboration, which enables students to take first and second year courses at Kokushikan University.

### Correspondence Course

■ Comprehensive  
(AA Course, IC Course)

**Two courses for students to choose from**

The correspondence program features a credit-based system in which the academic year is divided into four semesters with credit approval carried out four times per year, and 74 credits or more are required for graduation. Students can choose one of two courses: the AA Course in which schooling is carried out in six-week periods, and the IC Course in which schooling is concentrated into a one-week period each semester and students can use the remaining free time for various activities such as sports activities, performing arts activities, and long-term volunteering activities. Thus, students are able to study at their own pace.

In the case of transfer students, depending on the number of credits they have acquired, it is possible for them to graduate in the same year as students at their previous school.

### Full-Time Course

■ Comprehensive

**Diverse course system that brings out the individuality of students**

The Full-Time Course offers a diverse course system in which students can increase their aptitude and achieve their goals, and it features an abundant curriculum. During the first year, students thoroughly develop fundamental abilities, and during the second year, they choose from among four course paths that include humanities and sciences. Each course includes martial arts (judo and kendo) and the arts (music, visual art, and calligraphy) in the curriculum as part of human education. An after-school support program is also offered from Monday to Friday in order to further improve students' study skills.



Kokushikan has unique, high-level research institutes which enable deeper understanding and multifaceted research in specialized fields. The university provides an arena for research exchanges focusing on industry-government-academia collaboration.

## Institute for Cultural Studies of Ancient Iraq

**Shedding light on the ancient culture of Eurasia centering on Iraq**  
The Institute for Cultural Studies of Ancient Iraq was established in 1976 with the aim of elucidating the ancient culture of Eurasia centering on Iraq. Through research carried out in regions of Iraq, it has achieved valuable results. It also contributes to the UNESCO project for the restoration of Iraq's cultural treasures in collaboration with the Jordanian government. Furthermore, it has conducted field work in Syria, Iran, Saudi Arabia and Lebanon and has been involved in other joint research projects, interdisciplinary research and international exchanges. The results of this institute's research are available in several publications, including its own journal, "Al-Rafidan."



## Institute of Budo and Moral Education

**Researching martial arts and putting into practice and disseminating the combination of literary and martial arts**  
The Institute of Budo and Moral Education was founded in 1978 with the aim of practicing and disseminating humanistic teaching combining the pen and the sword through the study of martial arts, which have been passed on to this day as Japan's traditional culture. The institute proactively carries out activities including research on martial arts in the 21st century, the sponsorship of lectures and seminars, and the publication of journals. Furthermore, as well as exchange with foreign countries and instruction on martial arts both in Japan and overseas, in recent years the institute has been actively engaged in martial arts for people with disabilities and also has been investigating methods of developing human resources capable of contributing to world peace.



## Research Institute of Disaster Prevention and Emergency Medical System

**Supporting disaster-prevention efforts in the community through education and research relating to disasters and emergency medical treatment**  
Immediately after the Great East Japan Earthquake, an unprecedented disaster, struck on March 11, 2011, Kokushikan faculty members and student volunteers engaged in a wide range of support activities, including medical treatment and relief. These activities increased the social awareness of Kokushikan University as an organization that provides disaster support. It is feared that a major earthquake will occur directly underneath Tokyo in the near future. Amid an increasing recognition of the need for disaster management, the Research Institute of Disaster Prevention and Emergency Medical System was established in 2012 to conduct comprehensive research relating to disaster prevention and emergency relief both in Japan and overseas, as well as to provide support activities, train disaster-prevention leaders, and conduct disaster-prevention activities in cooperation with local communities. From now on, the research institute, as part of the university with the function of a disaster-prevention center, will endeavor to enhance its system on the basis of accurate data and new concepts.



## Asia-Japan Research Center

**A place for open research exchange investigating Asian phenomena**  
The Asia-Japan Research Center is an institute for academically investigating social and cultural phenomena in rapidly-changing Asia. It also provides a place for open research exchange. It holds seminars, workshops, symposium, and so forth, and outlines the outcomes of its activities for the public via its website and publications. The center promotes international academic exchanges and aims to develop its activities, including enlightenment activities and policy recommendations in order to improve relations and strengthen cultural ties in the region.



## Wellness Research Center

**A place for comprehensive research activities related to health enhancement**  
The goal of the Wellness Research Center is to achieve wellness for elderly persons, the general public, and young people. The center carries out comprehensive research activities related to health enhancement, such as the development of programs to foster good exercise habits among the elderly, research on emergency medical care, and analysis of the effects of variety types of sports training. Based on the results of such activities, the center also carries out the development of devices and educational activities and trains instructors and operators, as well as conducts regional "service learning" activities in collaboration with the region.

### Aiming to upgrade academic information services and strength study support

The affiliated libraries that make up the Kokushikan University Library and Information Commons are the Central Library and Information Commons (Setagaya Campus), the Tsurukawa Library and Information Commons (Machida Campus), and the Tama Library and Information Commons (Tama Campus). These are future-oriented facilities that provide an integrated study environment and to upgrade academic information services so as to foster the information literacy required by the times—namely, the ability to understand, collect, analyze, and transmit information necessary for oneself and one's organization.

The libraries stock around 890,000 books and journals and there are 99 information terminals in the Central Library, 80 in the Tsurukawa Library, and 15 in the Tama Library. There are also 13 computer



rooms on the campuses (3 on Setagaya, 7 on Umegaoka, 2 on Machida, and 1 on Tama), with more than 800 computer terminals available for educational use. About half of these computers run on thin-client systems connected to the Internet. They enable the viewing and retrieval of university and external databases, e-journals, the KISS (Knowledge Integrated Service Systems) academic repository, and other information services. Moreover, the libraries make efforts to further improve the use of information resources: for example, extending opening hours, allowing local residents to use library services, promoting open use of the computer terminal rooms for educational purposes, and installing information terminals that can be used 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

In order to upgrade academic information services, OPAC, a search system for academic materials stored at Kokushikan University, and the KISS repository, which stores around 8,000 academic papers, lecture materials, and other information, have been transferred to cloud systems, thereby enabling their convenient use on mobile devices and also guaranteeing the continuity of educational

and research support at times of disaster. To provide conditions for creating intellectual property, the libraries have realized quiet viewing environments, group study space, audiovisual environments, and refresh environments. In addition, efforts are made to increase intellectual productivity by introducing content production equipment, such as scanners, large color printers, and image editing equipment, and assigning staff to assist in their use.

Besides these activities, the libraries have built and operate the KAEDE Net, the basic network of Kokushikan University. The KAEDE Net connects the Setagaya and Machida campuses and the Setagaya and Tama campuses by means of 10 GBit high-speed dedicated lines and links campus buildings by 1 GBit network lines, thereby giving powerful backup to education and research. Our many-sided support for education and research also includes the establishment of more than 70 wireless LAN access points.

## International Center

### Hub for academic exchange, studying abroad, and accepting international students

Ever since its establishment, the International Center has proactively carried out academic exchanges through education and research activities directed toward the international community, sending students abroad for study and training and accepting international students. Currently there are about 800 international students studying at Kokushikan. The center consists of the International Relations Section and the International Student Service Section. The International Relations Section carries out academic exchange with 40 foreign universities and one research institute that Kokushikan has formed agreements with and exchanges trainees with. This section also serves as the gateway for exchange with overseas education and research institutes, and when Kokushikan students



study abroad, it provides comprehensive support so that their time living abroad can be safe and secure. The International Student Service Section is directed toward international students. It provides information, advisory services, and

procedural support in regard to visas, housing, medical needs, and scholarships. It also gives support so that international students can feel secure and concentrate on their studies.

## Lifelong Learning Center

### Upgrading the skills of students and offering lectures for citizens

The Lifelong Learning Center provides research results and education functions to a wide range of society. It was launched with the objective of contributing to the development of education, art, academics, and culture for ordinary citizens in addition to students. The center carries out various projects and

has offices on the three campuses of Setagaya, Machida, and Tama. The Lifelong Learning Center offers "certification courses" for upgrading the skills of students in regard to employment and so on and "university extension courses" for making a social contribution to the region. The center also provides the "Setagaya e-College" e-learning system-type lifelong learning course in cooperation with three other universities in Setagaya Ward and the Setagaya Ward Board of Education.



### Educational Activities

#### Certification Courses

● To improve students' skills and to help in their search for jobs, Kokushikan maintains collaborative relations with professional schools and offers various certification courses. Certification courses cover a wide range, including bookkeeping, computer skills, notary public services, and the Test of English for International Communication (TOEIC). Every year many students completing these courses successfully pass the certification exams.

#### University Extension Courses

● Kokushikan University offers three seasonal University Extension Courses per year. Open to persons of various age groups ranging from children to senior citizens, the spring, fall and winter programs start in April, September and January, and cover major subject areas: liberal arts, languages, history, computer skills, arts, health, sports and martial arts.

#### Setagaya e-College

● This e-learning system of lifelong-study support services is jointly operated by four universities located in the Setagaya ward and the Setagaya Board of Education. The service aims to create an environment for "enjoying learning at anytime and anywhere."

## Career Formation Support Center

### Practical application of career education focusing on students' future

Currently, what is needed of universities is "career education" which fosters the ability of students to be able to acquire a sense of purpose regarding the future, take on a career view, and independently choose a career path. In order to incorporate and implement career education in the curriculum, the center has established a system that offers coordination and collaboration functions with faculties. The center supports the job-hunting activities of students with events such as the "job-hunting hot space




(joint briefings by companies at the school)" and the operation of mobile sites. The centers at Setagaya, Machida, and Tama provide a variety of information related to job-hunting, including Internet terminals, books on job-hunting approaches, job information magazines, company information, and information on

job offers. The center provides diverse support for job hunting, and staff members are always on hand to help students who have anxieties or concerns about their job-hunting activities.

## Student Counseling Rooms

Student Counseling Rooms are located in each campus at Setagaya, Machida and Tama. Specialist counselors and psychiatrists are on hand to respond to problems relating to student life, studies, personal relationships and other concerns. Furthermore, in order to create an environment that is readily accessible to students, counseling by female counselors is available on certain days. Appointments can also be made by telephone or fax.

## University Clinics

University clinics operate on each of the three campuses at Setagaya, Machida and Tama to help students, teachers and staff members to study and work in good health. It is possible to use the clinics for health consultation, medical care, and so on free of charge. The clinics are open from Monday through Saturday. University doctors are present at the clinics on each of the campuses two days a week. The clinics provide first-aid treatment for illnesses and injuries, and refer patients to other medical institutions as needed. The university clinics also conduct annual health exams for students, teachers and staff members for the prevention and early detection of illnesses.

## Residences

Kokushikan University provides housing to help students concentrate on studies and club activities and to ensure safe and comfortable living. All dormitories are located near the campuses for an easy commute to classes.

### Setagaya Dormitory

Located in a quiet environment adjoining Wakabayashi Park, this is a dormitory for undergraduate men. All rooms are for single occupancy. Capacity: 36 students.

### Tsurukawa Dormitory

This dormitory has 27 single occupancy rooms for undergraduate men and 49 single occupancy rooms for undergraduate women. In addition there are double occupancy rooms for 236 students belonging to sports teams. Both facilities are located inside the Machida Campus.

### Kokushikan University Guest House (International Student Dormitory)

This facility was completed in 2004 to serve as a dormitory for international graduate students and has a capacity for 30 men and women in total. All rooms are for single occupancy. Equipped with the latest security systems and induction cooking facilities in the common kitchen, the Guest House provides a safe and comfortable living environment.

Kokushikan University offers various forms of financial assistance to highly motivated students. In addition to the university's own scholarships, other types of financial assistance are available, as shown on the right.





## Maple Century Hall

Opened 2013

As one of the commemorative projects to mark Kokushikan's centennial, a building complex was constructed on the Setagaya Campus on the theme of "healthy body and mind."

### Environment- and Energy-Conscious Design

Maple Century Hall has three basement floors and five floors above ground and its total floor space is approximately 13,000 m<sup>2</sup>. The southern and western sides are entirely covered by high-transmittance glass, so the inside of the building is light and spacious. Power is generated by solar-heated water tanks and photovoltaic panels installed on the roof so as to save energy. Solar power is also used, among other things, for the heated swimming pool, floor heating, and showers. Furthermore, in order to reduce energy consumption, a water-saving circulation method is employed especially for the heated swimming pool. Pump power is controlled by circulating surplus water for use and adjusting filtering capacity according to the number of users there are. In addition, the glass sides have a double-skin structure, which provides excellent insulation and reduces the solar radiation load.

# School Emblem & Symbol



## School Emblem “Maple Leaf” - A choice made by all -

It was in 1919 that Kokushikan made its historic move from Azabu Kogai-cho to a site near the Shoin Shrine in Setagaya. In the preceding year, the founders of Kokushikan had visited the Shoin Shrine to show their deep respect for Yoshida Shoin, who pursued such a strict and uncompromising way of life as a thinker and educator during the tumultuous closing years of the Edo Period. The founders earnestly hoped to follow in the footsteps of Yoshida Shoin and to pattern the newly established Kokushikan after Shoka Sonjuku, the private school that Shoin had established. Two notable trees stand in the precincts of the Shoin Shrine: one a cherry tree representing Yamato-damashii (Japanese spirit), and the other an old maple tree symbolizing the passion that animated Yoshida Shoin. On the morning of the Kokushikan High School (the antecedent of today’s Kokushikan University) opening ceremony, Tokujiro Shibata, the first headmaster,

saw the bright maple leaves reflecting the sunlight and thought of Shoin’s purity of heart. At that moment, he decided that the emblem of the new school would feature the maple leaf. In the spring of 1920, Chancellor Shibata referred this matter to the students’ association, known as the Kokushi Gakuseikai, and explained his vision. The students and all members of the school unanimously supported the proposal and formally adopted as their emblem the seven-sided maple leaf symbolizing the “seven lives that “kokushi” are prepared to give for their country.”



## Kokushikan Symbol

The Kokushikan Symbol has two rectangles representing “history” and “future hope” overlapping an arc, symbolizing the “earth.” This in turn represents Kokushikan’s initial “K.” Kokushikan aims to establish an energetic academic environment with people using their own culture, knowledge and skills dynamically and in a way open to the community and

global society. The School color “Kokushikan Red” is inspired by the deep red of the maple leaf and expresses our passion and delight. It was established as part of a 1997 program to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the university.

### Founders and Supporters of Kokushikan

Kokushikan was founded during the boom years of the First World War. However, this was also a period of gloom and social unrest. The rice riots that started with a group of housewives in a small fishing village in Toyama Prefecture quickly spread to all parts of Japan within a mere ten days. It was under these conditions that a group of young people came together to form "Seinen Dai-Mindan" (Greater Association of Youth). The founding members included Tokujiro Shibata, Shusuke Abe, Daisuke Hanada, Teiichi Kita and Tsukasa Uetsuka. The aim of the Association was to contribute to the prosperity of the nation and stability in the lives of the people through "debate" and "education."

In the field of debate, in June 1916 the Association started the publication of the magazine, Taimin, which promoted the Association's aim until 1945. As for the field of education, Kokushikan was founded as a private academy in November 1917. Originally located in Azabu, Tokyo the academy moved to Setagaya in 1919 and made a fresh start as a full-fledged educational institution with a middle school and high school. Today's Kokushikan University traces its origins to these early initiatives. As it grew and developed in an age of numerous vicissitudes, Kokushikan was blessed with many able supporters. First and foremost, mention must be made of the contributions of the founders of Kokushikan who took on the responsibility of managing the institution. Second come the "four pillars" of Kokushikan consisting of Mitsuru Toyama, Soho Tokutomi, Utaro Noda, and Eiichi Shibusawa. The names of Seigo Nakano and Taketora Ogata are also indelibly linked to the history of Kokushikan.

1964 Faculty of Engineering added Departments of Civil Engineering and Architecture. Land acquired for Dazaifu Campus (closed in April 2013).

1965 Graduate School of Political Science and Graduate School of Economics established, offering master's and doctoral courses; Faculty of Political Science and Economics II (evening division) opened, with Departments of Political Science and Economics.

1966 Tsurukawa Campus opened; Faculty of Law established; Faculty of Letters established with Departments of Education, History and Geography, and Literature.

2001 Department of Modern Business Law added to the Faculty of Law; Graduate Schools of Sport System, and Human Sciences opened, offering master's courses; Department of Electrical Engineering at Faculty of Engineering changed its name to the Department of Electrical and Electronics Engineering.

2002 School of Asia 21 established. Departments of Mechanical Engineering and Civil Engineering at Faculty of Engineering changed their names to the departments of Mechanical Engineering and Applied Information Technology, and Civil and Environmental Engineering.

2003 Doctoral courses added to the Graduate Schools of Sport System and Human Sciences; Faculty of Political Science and Economics I and II merge, offering both day and evening classes.

2006 Graduate School of Interdisciplinary Intellectual Property Laws opened, offering a master's course. Graduate School of Globalising Asia opened, offering master's and doctoral courses.

2007 School of Science and Engineering established.

2008 Construction completed of the Umegaoka Complex (Building No. 34) on the Setagaya Campus. Department of Sport Education for Children added to the Faculty of Physical Education.



### Access to Setagaya Campus

- 9-minute walk from Umegaoka Station on the Odakyu Line.
- 6-minute walk from Shoinjinja-mae Station or Setagaya Station on the Tokyu Setagaya Line.
- From Shibuya Station West Exit Bus Terminal (Bus Stop #18), take a bus bound for Setagaya Kumin Kaikan (Setagaya Civic Hall). Get off at the end of the line; 1-minute walk from there.



### Access to Machida Campus

- Take the school bus (free) from Tsurukawa Station on the Odakyu Line.
- From Odakyu Line Tsurukawa Station Bus Terminal (Bus Stop #2), take a bus bound for Tsurukawa Danchi (Tsurukawa Housing Development) via Roku-chome, Center or Kitamawari. Get off at Kokushikan Daigaku-mae (Kokushikan University); the ride takes 8-10 minutes.

#### Bus stop for the Tsurukawa Station school bus [From Tsurukawa Station to Machida Campus]

- Time required: 10 minutes  
Come out of the ticket barrier (one location only at the station) of Tsurukawa Station, and walk straight for 20m until you reach Tsurukawa Kaido Street. The bench has an identifying mark.
